STEPHANIE TARLOWE

How did Ag Education and FFA help prepare you for your career?

"Perfect timing to ask this – last week, we had an on-farm lab about mastitis in which we performed the California Mastitis Test. Whereas most of my classmates had never seen the paddles before, I learned how to use them my freshman year in preparation for the Dairy Foods CDE! The Dairy and Horse Judging CDEs also got me used to knowing what 'normal' looks like for these animals, making it easier to spot sick or injured animals during physical examinations. It was also helpful to start learning terminology as early as my high school animal science class so the vocabulary wasn't as overwhelming when I got to undergrad courses. I can also confidently say I never would have taken an interest in farm animals if it hadn't been for the exposure I got through involvement in my ag classes and FFA. FFA is still highly regarded by many even after all this time after high school."

"To me, a successful life is having a solid support system of friends and family, and a steady job that you enjoy doing that gives you the financial security to be able to 'treat yo self' every once in a while."

What is your favorite FFA memory?

"I got attended the 2010 National FFA Convention as a member of the National FFA Band. This was a really unique experience that allowed me to combine my two biggest passions of music and FFA. I quickly became friends with the people from across the country who shared these passions, and even got to play a solo on stage in front of the convention crowd!"

What advice would you give to FFA members?

"Don't see high school as a chore. Find things you enjoy doing, whether it's a sport or a club, or even some activity unrelated to school that you do with friends when the day is done. If you've got your eye on college, pay attention to classes that will set you up for success there. For example, by challenging myself with AP classes in high school, I entered college with enough credits to graduate a year early; saving money in tuition, and allows me to get started in my career that much sooner.""
